It is our servant in education.

The inclusive teacher is a student oriented professional who:

- Knows that the student is more important than the curriculum.
- Knows that differences among students are to be valued.
- Knows children learn better together than apart.
- Knows the teacher can control the curriculum to the benefit of the student.
- Knows the effort is worth the prize of a child's learning.

THE CURRICULUM AS SOCIAL OPPORTUNITY

- Humans are social animals (Spinoza)
- School is first of all about learning with and meeting others
- School is where all children of a community come together on a regular basis to learn and play
- It is the right of students, regardless of race, ethnicity, or gender, to be together for their good and the good of society
- This right and this good is not cancelled because the child has a disability.

VYGOTSKY & CHILDREN'S LEARNING

- Learning is a social act
- Learners learn better with a guide who can show them the path
- The path is from the known to the unknown to the future

THE BASICS OF VYGOTSKY

- 1. Learning is a social activity which occurs between a learner & a teacher.
- 2. The teacher may be a professional, a parent, a peer, or any other person who knows more than the learner, and is able to communicate that knowledge.
- 3. What is to be learned can be organized into a series of steps in keeping with the abilities of the learner.
- 4. What is needed to facilitate learning are concrete objects and materials, language, and interacting with others.

- Traditionally, classroom teachers did it all on their own.
