

# John O'Brien November 15, 1946 — June 27, 2025

Listen to Obituary

John William O'Brien died peacefully at his home in Lithonia, Georgia, on June 27, 2025.

John dedicated his life to creating, sustaining, and advocating communities that support every person. He consulted with people with disabilities, their families and allies, advocacy groups, service providers, and governments all over the world.

While he always emphasized the importance of inclusion and the priority of human beings over institutions and rules, he built a long list of professional connections over his seven-decade career. John was a Fellow of the Centre for Welfare Reform (UK) and was affiliated with the Center on Human Policy, Law and Disability, Syracuse University (US), InControl Partnerships (UK) and the Marsha Forest Centre (Canada). John taught at the Emory University School of Medicine and many Universities around the world, including McGill University in Montreal, Quebec; York University in Toronto, Ontario. Keio University in Tokyo (where -he was delighted to report-his lecture was in such demand that it would not fit in the school's facility and his hosts had to rent a Sumo Arena).

John contributed influential ideas to the fields of disability support and disability studies, including the McGill Action Planning System (MAPS), Planning Alternative Tomorrows with Hope (PATH), and the Five Accomplishments. His work is widely used to help build more inclusive and life-affirming communities across the world. He described himself as "an itinerant curious person," and always emphasized that his role was to learn from other people's social innovations, tell their stories, and share ideas to build community.

His writing has been translated into twenty languages. With his beloved wife, Connie Lyle O'Brien, and many other collaborators, John published over a dozen books, hundreds of articles, and a catalog of video workshops. John was born in Potsdam, New York, on November 15, 1946, to John Leo and Elizabeth Johnston O'Brien. He grew up with one brother, Timothy James O'Brien. He was educated at Le Moyne College (B.A. in Philosophy), at Syracuse University (M.S.W.), and by the tens of thousands of books he read and collected throughout his life. He had two sons, Sean O'Brien of Canton, New York, and Kevin O'Brien of Tacoma, Washington, and two grandchildren, Ciaran and Finn O'Brien of Canton, New York. In addition to his wife, sons, grandsons, and brother, John leaves behind 2 daughters-in-law, 6 sisters-in-law; many nephews, nieces, grandnephews, and grandnieces; thousands of friends and students; and an uncountable number of books.

He is loved and he is missed.



John O'Brien died a few days ago. He was a good friend. He was brilliant. He was funny. He was generous. I remember seeing him at an event and mentioning to him some ideas for a presentation I was working on. He stared at me and his face took on that mirthful but dangerous look and his right

eyebrow started to move up gradually. Never a good sign. He listened to me until I lost momentum knowing something was amiss. John quietly said; "That is interesting Bob, it is almost like the material I sent you two months ago". My humiliation was almost worth it to just see his muted delight. Recently I did a presentation on Eugenics and its role in the development of human service design principles. I sent the presentation to John after I did it and asked what changes I could make if I presented it again. John's email was again muted but I could sense trouble almost immediately;" Bob, interesting idea following the development of human service design principles historically. You may want to check the number of people you sited dying in the holocaust though. You have added five million to the estimated numbers of people killed by the Germans". I loved being wrong and corrected by John. His use of understatement always cracked me up. At some point, it must have in the 1980's, there was a Western Canada Advance PASS workshop held in Winnipeg. Somehow, I was the local organizer. The morning of the first day went fine. I was feeling like a real event organizer must feel when things are going as they were planned. The first day had a morning session, an afternoon session, and an evening session. Very late afternoon someone handed me a note that someone from the hotel wanted to see me. I exited the room and was met by a hotel staff and about fifteen Chinese men with a variety of instruments. It was explained to me that they had booked the room early to set up and rehearse. I tried the authoritarian panic response 'there must be a mistake!" It failed. I then sent a note up to John at the front of the room. The note said, "Chinese Orchestra has this room booked for 20 minutes from now until 10:00pm. We must exit. Booking error. Please inform Wolf". John read and looked at the back of the room with a bemused look and then passed it on to Wolf who was mid-presentation. Wolf did not take disorganization well at all. He immediately screamed out my name. Well, just my last name. Public humiliation was not new to me, but juxtaposition of a Chinese orchestra and my culpability added an absurdist element that John found hilarious. John was brilliant. He and Connie were leaders and part of a community of thinkers, visionaries, and activists who moved the thinking about personhood and place of people with disabilities in society forward. John was a prolific writer, thinker, innovator, and he left us

with the information we require to keep moving forward. It is an amazing legacy. The fact that he will not be with us to help us think, ponder, laugh, reconsider, try another way is for today a source of great sadness. Thank-you John.
